The specific choice of a komal note as the Vadi is significant, contributing to the raga's melancholic yet stately mood.

## Prakriti (Nature) and Raga Classification

Rag Darbari is classified as a Shadj-Pancham raga, meaning that Sa and Pa are generally present and considered important, though Pa is omitted in the ascent. Its overall character is often described as audav-sampurna (having five notes in ascent and all seven in descent) or sampurna-sampurna (all seven notes in both ascent and descent), depending on the school of thought and the specific elaboration. However, the omission of Rishabh and Pancham in the ascent is a widely accepted characteristic. The presence of Komal Gandhar and Komal Nishad, coupled with Tivra Madhyam, places it in the category of Komal Rishabh, Komal Gandhar, and Tivra Madhyam ragas.

## The Characteristic Melodic Phrases (Pakad) of Rag Darbari

The true soul of a raga is revealed in its characteristic phrases, known as pakad. These short melodic movements are instantly recognizable and define the raga's essence. For Rag Darbari, some of these include: g M D n S' (Ascending, establishing the upper octave) S' n D M M g r S (Descending, showcasing the characteristic descent with Rishabh) g M D M g (A common phrase emphasizing the komal Gandhar and Tivra Madhyam) D n S' n D M g (Illustrating the interplay between Dhaivat and Nishad, leading back to Gandhar) M g M D n (A fluid movement often heard in the ascent) These phrases are not rigid rules but rather foundational building blocks that artists creatively expand upon. The art lies in the subtle nuances of gamak (oscillations), meend (glides), and the precise articulation of each note, especially the komal Gandhar and Nishad.

## The Emotional Resonance (Rasa) of Rag Darbari

Rag Darbari is renowned for its ability to evoke a complex palette of emotions, primarily centered around: Karuna Rasa (Pathos/Sadness): The presence of komal Gandhar and Nishad, particularly when rendered with a melancholic touch, lends itself to expressions of sadness, longing, and introspection. Shant Rasa (Peace/Tranquility): Despite its melancholic undertones, Darbari can also evoke a profound sense of peace and serenity, especially in its slower tempos and more contemplative renditions. Gambhir (Seriousness/Solemnity): The stately progression of notes and the deliberate pace often associated with Darbari create an atmosphere of seriousness and grandeur, reminiscent of royal courts. Shringar Rasa (Love/Romance) - in a contemplative or longing aspect: While not overtly celebratory, the introspection and yearning that can be expressed in Darbari

can also be interpreted as a form of contemplative love or longing. The emotional depth of Rag Darbari makes it a favorite for late-night performances, where its somber yet uplifting character can truly resonate with the audience.

An overemphasis on pathos can render it overly somber, while an absence of introspection can dilute its essence. **The Art of Meend and Gamak:** The smooth meend between notes, especially from M to g, or D to n, and the subtle gamak on the komal notes are crucial for imbuing Darbari with its characteristic flavor. **Exploration of the Upper Octave:** While the ascent begins with Sa, the emphasis on the upper Sa' and the descending phrases from it are vital for completing the raga's structure and emotional arc. **Improvisation within the Structure:** Artists have considerable scope for improvisation within the established framework of Darbari. The alaap (unmetered melodic improvisation) allows for a slow and deliberate unfolding of the raga's potential, while the taan (fast melodic passages) can showcase virtuosic agility while staying true to the raga's spirit.
